#### "Sixteen Objects - Seventy Years of Yad Vashem"

On the window ledge is a Hanukkah menorah; outside, a swastika flag flies from the NSDAP building. Few images are as powerful as this photograph by Rosi (Rahel) Posner, wife of the rabbi of Kiel.

The image acquires additional significance for two reasons, however: firstly, Rosi (Rahel) Posner took the photograph in 1931, two years before the National Socialists seized power in Germany. And secondly, the menorah survived the journey into exile along with its owners. Their descendants later entrusted it to Yad Vashem – The World Holocaust Remembrance Center, where it is now on display in the museum. The power of artifacts and the stories they tell are the starting point for this exhibition.

Each of the sixteen exhibits is unique. Their unifying feature is that they belonged to a family or an individual who once lived in Germany and was part of society. They were unremarkable every-day objects, and so they would have remained had they not come to symbolise the countless lives and communities which were destroyed. All the artifacts are now held in the Yad Vashem collection.

The sixteen objects represent different localities, one from each of the sixteen federal states in present-day Germany – a reminder that every town in Germany lost part of its history and identity in the Holocaust. The artifacts now return to Germany for the first time for this exhibition. Yad Vashem – The World Holocaust Remembrance Center, which marks its seventieth anniversary this year, preserves, researches, publicises and teaches these lost histories.


